GENEVA TAKES 3 MAT TITLES IN SECTIONALS

Geneva High captured three individual Section Five wrestling titles in an otherwise mediocre performance in the Sectional indoor sports carnival at Rochester over the weekend.

Coacs Merrill Braymen's tankmen had a day of fours as they placed fourth in the running behind Canandaigua, Irondequoit and Wellsville. Finishing in that slot in the meet were Ken Seeley in the 50 yard freestyle, Jack Shone in the 100 yard freestyle, Colin Morehouse in the 100 yard breaststroke, Fred McLaughlin in the fancy diving, and the team of Shone, Serven, Seeley and Morehouse in the 200 yard relay. Dale Johnson placed fifth in the diving contest.

GRAPPLERS ACTIVE

Entering a nine-man team in the Class B tournament with the three men in the Class A group, Ed Coney's wrestling squad grapplers showed much fight and spirit throughout. The 'A' tourney includes all of the schools in the city of Rochester where wrestling has been an interscholastic sport for years. The Red and Black trio reached the finals in this group before throwing out Bill Barood, 133, Mel Dickinson, 175 and George Haddad were the losers.

In the 'B' tourney, which included schools outside the city of Rochester, saw Geneva deadlocked with Wellsville at the finish, each school copping four individual crowns.

Geneva originally had a ten-man squad but due to Bill Buckley's injury, a forfeit was necessary in the 154 pound class.
