

School Athletes Compete in Winter Sport Carnival Here

County winners in school athletic events were determined in the winter sport carnival held in Perry Monday, starting at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and continuing until 10 in the evening. The winners will go to Rochester on Saturday, March 29, to compete in the sectionals. The wrestling events were semi-finals, the winners to compete in the finals to be held in Perry Friday evening.

Write-ins Cause Election Flurry

Reports Tuesday that a silent campaign to upset the village election with a write-in candidate resulted in a flurry that caused Republican leaders to get on their bicycles and go out scouting for voters to combat the threat. The threatened bomb proved to be something of a dud but the outcome was a total of 145 votes cast instead of the expected handful.

The write-in campaign resulted in 10 votes for Edison Barnard for trustee against Howard Wallace, Republican, who was also endorsed by the Democrats. However, Mr. Wallace coasted in comfortably with 98 Republican and 25 Democratic votes for a total of 123, while Frank Austin, Democrat endorsed by the Republicans, polled 93 Republican and 34 Democratic votes for a total of 128.

The insurgent movement is said to have stemmed from a disgruntled Democrat who was dissatisfied with the endorsement of a Republican, and a "Russian election" with only one set of candidates to be voted upon. The difference between the Democratic votes cast for Mr. Austin and Mr. Wallace was 10, exactly the same number that Mr. Barnard received.

Teachers' Salaries Go Up \$14,000

A net increase of \$14,000, in round numbers, is indicated for faculty salaries for 1952-53, Perry Central Schools, according to returns from the salary notifications for the coming school year.

Of this increase, about \$8,550 represents normal increments in accordance with the salary schedule mandated by the State Dept. of Education as applied to the local board. The balance is represented by the proposed addition of two new faculty members necessary to take care of the increased registration and the larger volume of students now coming up thru the grades. One elementary teacher will be added for the fourth grade, and one high school teacher. Total salaries next year will amount to about \$210,000, compared with \$196,000 at present.

Two Resignations

Two resignations in the faculty lists have been announced, Miss Patricia Grady, third grade teacher, and Mrs. Helen Carr, kindergarten. Word has been received from Walter C. Fenwick, absent this year on military leave, that he will not return to Perry to assume his former position as fifth grade teacher.
