Region rules the mat with 10 state titles

ALBANY - Years back, Baseball America proclaimed Rochester was Baseball City, U.S.A. The Rhinos proudly boast their home is Soccertown, U.S.A.

After Saturday night, the area has another title and this one can't be argued: Section V, Wrestling Capital of New York.

Displaying an unprecedented dominance on the mat. Section V wrestlers won 10 individual titles Saturday night at the New York State Wrestling Championships at Times Union Center. Seven others were runners-up.

As a result, Section V completed the state wrestling daily double by winning team titles in Divisions 1 and 2.

"It puts us on the front page in the state," said Chris Bourne, the "It proves what a great wrestling area we have."

Appropriately, the 2008 state tournament comes to Blue Cross Arena at the War Memorial, where four winners from Saturday may be looking to repeat their titles.

In four matches against Lamagra this year, Schuth was 3-1, winning the last three.

Webster Thomas senior Matthew Hodge capped the night with a 10-4 win over Randy Colling (Pioneer-VI) in the 275pound match.

In Divison 2, the Paddock brothers again brought gold back to Warsaw.

Two years after winning a state title at 96 pounds, Warsaw sophomore Ian Paddock returned to the title podium with a 15-0 technical fall over Nick Wilcox of Greene (Section IV).
