

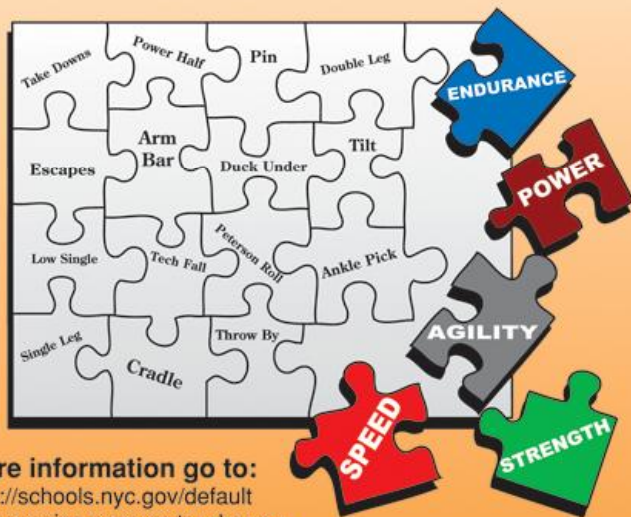

Both are fulltime employees and former coaches who have taught in the New York City Public Schools for the past 28 years. They can help to answer some questions and navigate through the system of job availability.



Beat the Streets Wrestling, Inc., in partnership with the New York City Department of Education and the Public School Athletic League, has been working hard to raise the profile of the sport of wrestling in NYC for over 2 years. The partners realize that in order

to fully maximize the initiative, dedicated and inspiring teachers and coaches will be needed.

Wrestling was introduced as an Interscholastic sport in the New York City Public School system in 1973 with 26 teams. Without any "feeder" programs in the Middle Schools they were unable to compete at the state level. In 2004, under the leadership of the Metropolitan Wrestling Association, began the Beat the Streets Wrestling Program with 1 school in 2004. The mission is to expand the base of wrestling through the public schools with certified teacher/coaches concentrating on the middle schools development.

In September of 2006 a partnership Grant was provided with the Fund for Education to expand the base of wrestling in the New York City Public School system. The 3 year agreement calls for the expansion of middle and high school teams. In the final year of the Partnership in 2011, there will be a minimum of 75 High Schools and 120 Middle schools in all 5 Boroughs.
